CHRONIC HOMELESSNESS

Of the 16 women who identified themselves as chronically homeless:

- 85% reported that they had been victims of violence since becoming homeless
- 68% reported mental health and/or substance use as a cause of their homelessness
- 69% had stayed in an emergency shelter
- were Indigenous 25%
- had their children with them and were living in shelter or transitional housing


THE BIGGEST GAPS IN SERVICE IDENTIFIED BY THE WOMEN WERE:
